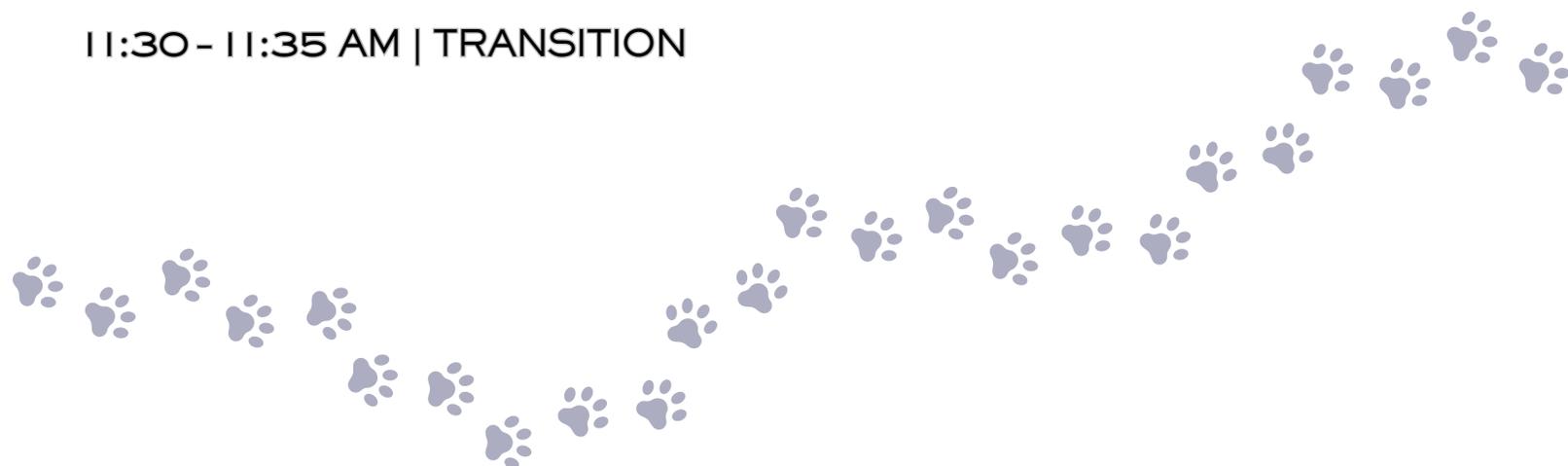

### **The Five-Minute Connection: High-Impact Micro-Interventions | G-102**

**Presenter: Micaela Ford | Coordinator, OCIS, Hardee Campus**

Student retention and belonging are fundamentally driven by frequent, positive interactions. This session focuses on turning everyday communication into powerful relationship-building opportunities. This quick session will equip all College employees with five high-impact, actionable "micro-interventions" (e.g., specific email templates, two-sentence reflection prompts, quick resource referrals) that build a stronger collegewide sense of connection and belonging for our students.

#### **Objectives:**

- List and articulate the purpose of the five "micro-interventions" presented, identifying how each directly contributes to student motivation and retention
- Commit to implementing at least one new communication strategy in their daily work within the next week (possibly develop a personal action plan or a SMART goal to go with it)
- Reflect on how consistent use of these micro-interventions by various departments contributes to a unified, collegewide culture of care and student success.

### **Hiring Process – How Does it work? | G-101**

This session provides a clear, end-to-end walkthrough of SFSC Procedure 5240 – Employee Recruitment and Selection. Participants will gain a practical understanding of how a position moves from initial request to employment offer, including key roles, timelines, and required steps. The session will demystify the hiring process by leading you to answer questions like “What happens when an applicant selection is made?”, “When is an employment offer made?”, and “What about the process for hiring Adjuncts?”

- Differentiate between the standard hiring process and the specific procedures used for hiring Adjunct faculty
